

He grew up in the North End, and has been a part of ICYA for over 20 years. He started in the chopper club, building bikes out back. Later, he attended Gem Lake. Throughout his life, he's been ministered to by Jeremy.

And now, Jonas is a part of Step Up Construction, as a crew leader and a role model for the other employees.

"I enjoy helping and teaching people what I know when they come to Step Up," he says.

When he first started, he struggled to show up to the job site every

day. But now, he takes his increased responsibility very seriously and is oftentimes the first one there!

In fact, this summer as the Step Up crew worked to repair the St. James Bridge, Jonas woke up at 5 am so he could pick up his team members and make sure they all arrived at the site on time.

"To me, Step Up is growth and friendship," he says. "To grow myself and learn, but also having awesome co-workers. You can see how they're learning and growing too."

### CHAOS TO PEACE

#### How you help build relationships that heal and transform!

Dimitrios first met our community Minister, Jeremy in Gangster Church at the Manitoba Youth Centre (MYC).

#### He was at the MYC, serving a three year sentence for a violent crime.

"I grew up in a turbulent..." household," he says. "My mom was a pretty bad alcoholic."

His childhood trauma pushed him towards drugs, alcohol and negative role models.

When Dimitrios reflected on meeting Jeremy at MYC, he shares, "I remember we did a lot of arguing. Not bad arguing — just me and all my questions. All of that opened my eyes that there's more to life."

When he got out of MYC, he fell back in with his old crew — selling drugs to make quick, easy money.

Until one day, it all came crashing down. The leader of his crew got caught selling drugs and was sent to jail. Right then, Dimitrios made a decision to stay out of prison.

Even though he had a steady job, it took three full years before Dimitrios could change his ways.

"When you're used to chaos, you think peace is pretty boring," he says.

**During the pandemic, Jeremy called Dimitrios regularly.** In one of those calls, he realized that Dimitrios was in a different space.

"You were telling me about cooking different recipes and how you were raising plants," Jeremy remembers.

"We weren't allowed to do anything, so I started learning about myself," Dimitrios adds. "Finding healthy things that you can focus your energy on is very important."

Today, Dimitrios is working on his third year of sobriety. And he's trying

to encourage other youth coming out of jail the way that Jeremy has encouraged him:

"Keep on," he says. "Just keep trying. That's the most important thing." ★
